51 Attend the 2007 Windemuth Reunion in Salt Lake City, UT

Salt Lake City - Fifty-one family members from across the United States and Canada attended the 2007 Windemuth International Reunion. This biennial event was held in downtown Salt Lake City from August 1-3, 2007.

Co-hosting the reunion were Gary and MarieLynn Schlenker, along with Gary's sister Chris Johnson and husband Kent, all residents of the Salt Lake region. Gary and Chris are 8th generation descendants of Johann Georg Windemuth.

Wednesday evening featured an opening reception and dinner with lots of time for family members to meet previously unknown "cousins" and catch up with others they had not seen in years. At least 20 people had never attended a Windemuth reunion before, but "felt right at home" as they met and mingled with other family members.

Chris had promised us "a reunion so memorable that those who didn't attend would wish they had!" That prediction became evident when she unveiled the "Families are Forever Family History" book. Chris had spent nearly a year collecting photos and stories about scores of Windemuth descendants before assembling them into the 200 page book. Dozens of copies were ordered, many as gifts for other family members unable to attend the reunion.

Thursday morning, the

Family Meeting was held at the Shilo Inn Hotel. Treasurer Leonard Wintermote reported the organization's finances were sound and no dues increase would be needed. Reports by the Secretary, Genealogy Committee and Cemetery Committee

were received and discussed. The Nominating Committee reported that Sue Wilkie, Vice President, had submitted her resignation for health reasons. The Committee recommended the following officers for a four year term: President-Gene Dennis; Vice President-Carole Birnie; Secretary-Shirley Mickey; and Treasurer-Leonard Wintermote. All were elected.

There were no proposals submitted to host the North American 2009 reunion. The officers were instructed to secure an appropriate location and proceed with reunion planning. (See page 5.)

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The Windemuths - Palatine Emigrants

After researching his family's history for many years, Fred Lund concluded "I am aghast with our family's role in the history of the New World." This article is the first in a series in which Fred will explore "who we really are" by examining our ancestors' life-shaping events. This story starts in Germany by looking at why our ancestors left their homes and ventured to the New World.

In the 18th and 19th century, the term "Palatine" was used in America to describe immigrants from "The Palatinate" and other German speaking areas. Finding an American reference to someone coming from the Palatinate may not point to a specific place of origin but rather to a location in or near western or southern Germany. Many came to North America after spending time (which may have consisted of months or generations) in countries such as Switzerland, England, Russia, Ireland, France and other countries throughout the world.

The Palatinate, otherwise known as the German PFALZ, was in German history, the lands of the count palatine, a title held by the leading secular prince of the Holy Roman Empire. Geographically, the Palatinate was divided between two small territorial clusters, the Rhennish or Lower Palatinate and the Upper Palatinate.

The Rhennish Palatinate included lands on both sides of the Middle Rhine River between its Main and Neckar tributaries. Its capital, until the 18th century, was Heidelberg. (editors note: the Windemuths resided in or near the Rhennish Palatinate.) The Upper Palatinate was located in Northern Bavaria, on both sides of the Naab River as it flows toward the Danube, and extended

eastward towards the Bohemian Forest. The boundaries of the Palatinate varied with the political and dynastic fortunes of the palatine counts.

During the War of the Grand Alliance (1689-1697) the troops of French Monarch Louis XIV ravaged the Rhennish Palatinate causing many Germans to emigrate. Many of the early German Settlers of America, i.e. the Pennsylvania Dutch, were refugees from the Palatinate. During the French Revolutionary War and the Napoleonic Wars, the Palatinate lands on the west bank of the Rhine were incorporated into France, while the eastern lands were divided between neighboring Baden and Hessen.

The winter of 1708 and 1709 was very long and cold in the Rhineland. People huddled around their fires as they considered quitting their homes and farms forever. The Palatines were heavily taxed and suffered religious persecution. Some remembered the Thirty Years' War (1618-1648) during which one out of every three Germans had perished.

The elders recalled that an American colonist by the name of William Penn had visited the area in 1677 and encouraged the people to go to a colony named Pennsylvania in America. Pennsylvania was a place where a man and

his family could be free of the problems that they were now encountering.

In 1709, the news of the Homeless Palatines had reached Great Britain's Queen Anne, and she decided to help them. She issued a proclamation inviting the Palatines to settle the New World. Those who accepted her offer would receive forty acres of land, free. They, however, had the obligation to clear it, settle it, and take an oath of allegiance to the crown. In the colony of New York, they were to work as laborers in the tar pits for the ship building industry. Everyone that accepted the offer was asked to transport themselves down the Rhine River to Rotterdam, Holland.

In the spring of 1709, thirty-two hundred Palatines left Rotterdam, enroute to New York.

hometown of Lueneburg, just south of Hamburg.

Although Hamburg was badly bombed during the Second World War, Lueneburg was not. The original walled section of town is still a pedestrian area with narrow cobble streets and open air markets twice a week. The old buildings still have the hoists hanging outside from the third floor from the days when the family shop was on the first floor, the living quarters on the second, and the warehouse on the third. The animals were in the courtyard in back.

I came with my children to teach at a local university. I had been teaching at a sister university in the United States and was offered a semester exchange. It has extended into six years, with some time back in the US. It is a very peaceful existence and I still enjoy the work. One daughter, Juliene Lee, stayed and graduated

from the international school, the other daughter, Shane Elise, wore me down into letting her return to finish high school in the US, but now confesses in a weak moment that she wishes she had stayed and benefited from the cultural advantages of living abroad, learning another language and being exposed to so many cultures.

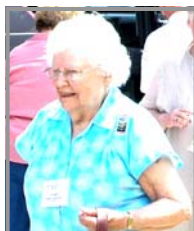

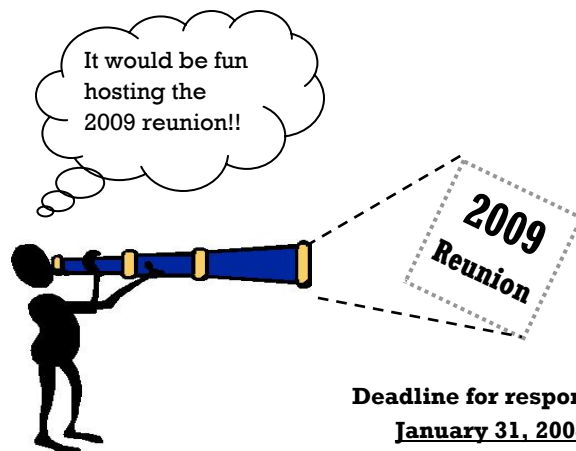

Verna Burrows of Nevada writes:

Our interest in family histories has become more intense since our grandson, Ty Quandt, was diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder called Niemann-Pick Type C. It is often referred to as "Children's Alzheimer's" as it affects the same cells in the same area of the brain and tragically leads to the same symptoms. By the age of 3 our daughter, Karen, knew he was not progressing as he should. She tried very hard to get a diagnosis but since the disorder is so rare many doctors are unaware of the symptoms. Ty was diagnosed when he was 8 years old. He is now ten. The third annual Touchdown for Ty Benefit is being held on January

26, 2008. All of our proceeds go to the Ara Parseghian Medical Research Foundation. The Parseghian family has lost 3 children to this genetic disorder.

We now make sure we add all medical information to our genealogy research. We have a website called www.touchdown4ty.org that explains the disorder in detail and what we and other Niemann-Pick families are doing to fight this genetic disorder.

The Make a Wish Foundation made it possible for Ty to become a fireman for a day. The smile he had all day long says it all.

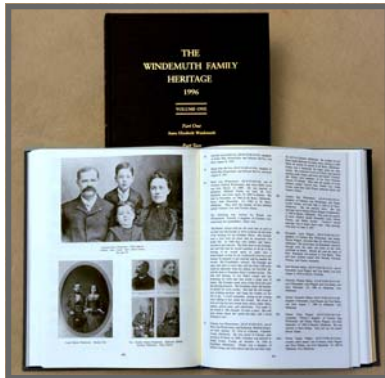
