## Attend the 2011 Family Reunion — At Bird-in-Hand on August 2-4, 2011

**W**indemuth descendants, spouses, family members and friends are all invited to the 16<sup>th</sup> family reunion which will be held August 2-4, 2011 at Bird-in-Hand, a small village near Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

Lancaster County is home to the oldest Amish settlement in the U.S.A. Arriving about the same time as our Windemuth ancestors, the Amish have preserved their lifestyle much as it was then. Our stay in Lancaster will give us the opportunity to learn how our ancestors lived when they arrived in America 275 years ago.

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The North American International Windemuth reunion began in 1981 at Stillwater, New Jersey. Since then, descendants have met every two years for a biennial reunion. The common thread shared by those attending is a DNA connection to Johann Christoph Windemuth, born 1676 in Allendorf, Germany. The reunions provide an opportunity for descendants (cousins) to meet and share our family's heritage.

## My Family's Life in Russia

Condensed from a story by Tatjana Atadschanow

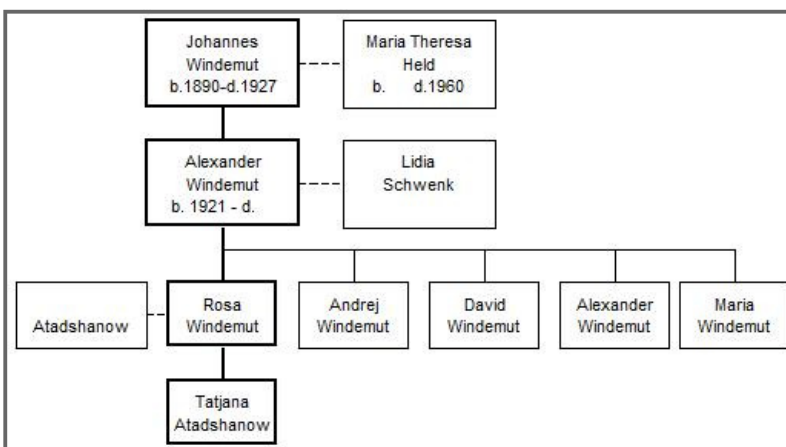
During the 1700's, war and famine in Germany triggered a flood of emigrants seeking a better life. Many headed west to the New World as did our Windemuth ancestors. Other Windemuth families went east and settled the Volga region of Russia.

Mike Wintermute of Noblesville, Indiana has been communicating with one of the "Volga German" families. Recently he received a history about the Johannes Windemut family from 1890 to the present.

Mike translated the story which portrays the hardships faced by the family, first in Volga and then after their relocation to Siberia during World War II. Here is a condensed version of the story written by Tatjana Atadschanow, great-granddaughter of Johannes and Maria Theresa (Held) Windemut.

Finally, after many years, the taboo that has prevented writing about the details of the German's history in Russia has been lifted. It is no coincidence that I am interested in this topic, as the history of Germans in Russia is closely connected with the history of my family.

My Ancestors came to the Volga during the reign of Catherine 2<sup>nd</sup> (about 1770); they wanted to escape from the tribulations in Germany. My great-grandmother, Maria Theresa (Held) Windemut, was

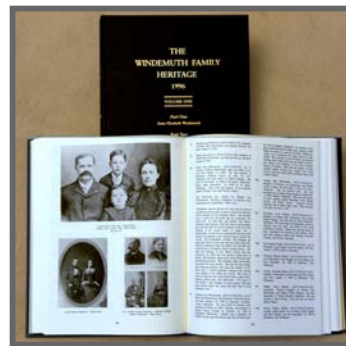

born (circa 1890) in Philipsfeld, Marx District, in the Saratov region of the Volga. Her family always spoke German and she never learned Russian. In those years the family lived in a wooden house with a dirt floor and there were some barns in the yard.

Life was hard, the year 1921 was especially difficult because of the famine in Powolschje. The family collected wild garlic and onions and made tea from cooked licorice. In the spring, ground squirrels were caught and fried. The house was heated in the winter with dried dung. Somehow, the family lived through that year without losing anyone.

The holidays were very important in our family, especially Christmas. The celebration began on Christmas Eve at 5 o'clock in the evening. Everyone went to church except for one adult who stayed behind to set the table and get ready for 6 o'clock when everyone returned home. Each family member was given a gift, but first the children were given homemade honey biscuits, some nuts and a pair of bonbons. The adults were then given gifts; a plate of sweets and a pocket knife, a scarf or cloth for a dress. This tradition has been passed down from generation to generation.

On August 26, 1941, two months after Germany invaded Russia, the Soviet government issued a decree requiring the removal of the Germans from the Volga. As they were deported, Great-Grandmother Maria Theresa asked herself torturous questions: "Who will provide everything we need? Who will take care of the dog? Will I ever see Philipsfeld again?" In her heart she knew she would never return. She never did and died in 1960.

During the deportation, people from neighboring Russian villages came into the street, looked silently at the passing children and elderly and shook their heads in sorrow. They pressed apples and tomatoes into their neighbor's hands and expressed their sympathy. During the journey, epidemics broke out but medical help was not available. The soldiers would just throw the dead onto the bank of the road.

In the beginning, the Siberians were friendly to the Germans, but soon the Soviet government made it known that Volga Germans were considered enemies and to treat them

as such. Regulations were put into effect that included a life-threatening 20 years of forced labor if any exile attempted to escape.

In January 1942, my grandfather Alexander Windemut (age 21), was "drafted" into forced labor in the Labor Army. Placed in guarded camps, the detainees were humiliated and faced immense suffering. They worked 12 hours every day on a daily ration of herbal broth and 600 grams of bread. The bread was baked with whatever ingredients were available and looked

like a piece of clay. After a short time, the men became walking skeletons, difficult to recognize. One in three died of starvation and vitamin deficiency. By the end of 1942, women were also "drafted" into the Labor Army.

The war ended and in May of 1947 Grandfather Alexander Windemut returned from the labor camp very sick but not broken. He was happy to be alive. Sometime after, he met my Grandmother Lidia, a widow whose husband had been killed at the front. Their marriage was finally registered in 1955 when restrictions were lifted.

I want to acknowledge the lovely children that were raised by my Grandmother (Lidia) Wintemut. She worked

to keep the German culture alive; she was pretty, could sew beautifully, had good taste, dressed in very attractive simple dresses and was always the center of attention. My mother, Rosa, got her good taste from grandmother.

*Editor's note: Since the mid 1990's, German heritage families in Siberia have been allowed to relocate. Rosa, her cousin Andreas and other family members, have returned to Germany. The German government has played an important role on behalf of the German Russians by helping build the Siberian Training Center which educates people for work in modern technologies.*

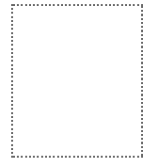
