Peter Preston Wintermute

1832—1877

2nd Great Grandson Georg Philip Windemuth

Peter Preston Wintermute, son of Isaac Wintermute and Sarah Jane Smith, of Horseheads, New York was born in Orange County, New York on January 14, 1832. At fourteen years of age he had attained such proficiency in the usual course of study as then taught, that he was sent to Genesee College, where he remained for over three years. From there he went to the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute at Troy, New York. At that time, it was known as the highest graded mathematical institute in the country, except for West Point. He

remained there for three years and graduated as a civil engineer. He at once accepted a position on the Great Western Railway, Canada. After the completion of the road he accepted a like position on the Erie Canal during its enlargement. In the spring of 1856 here signed an order to take a position as chief engineer of the old La Crosse and Milwaukee Railway. He remained there until the spring of 1857, when he went to Canada and engaged in his profession on various roads there. This ended his labors as a civil engineer. In 1858, when he was 25 years of age, he went to Elmore, New York, and studied law with G.L. Smith. He was admitted to the bar the following spring. About this time, April 21, 1858, he was married to Miss Jane Anna Stinson, an English lady of Hamilton, Canada West. She was a daughter of Thomas Stinson and Margaret Zimmerman. Peter moved to St Paul, Minnesota, where he lived and worked until 1867. Then he returned to Hamilton, Canada West. After this he moved to New York City and in the summer of 1871 he again moved west, locating at Yankton, South Dakota. While there he engaged in the banking business.

The Ceilidh Country Lodge is a two-story Inn and it does not have an elevator. If you need first floor accommodation because of mobility issues, please be sure to ask for that. I outlined the basic plan for our time together last newsletter entitled, "Looking Forward". The only change is on Wednesday, July 12th, we will be participating in an old-fashioned car rally. It will provide an opportunity to see and do some things that we couldn't experience if we took a tour bus. If you are coming to Baddeck and do not have your own car, there are two choices. You can travel in a vehicle with other cousins, or if you would prefer, we can rent vans for the day. We will have sign-up sheets ready for those cousins that have space in their vehicles and are willing to share a ride, and sign-up sheets for those looking for a ride. (There will be an additional charge for the vans, but we won't know that price until we know how many people want to avail themselves of this option.) There is a place on the back of the reunion registration form to indicate your preferences. In Canada, Eh!

Chris Austin Hadfield is a retired Canadian astronaut who was the first Canadian to walk in space. An engineer and former Royal Canadian Air Force fighter pilot, Hadfield has flown two space shuttle missions and served as commander of the International Space Station.

Hadfield was inspired as a child when he watched the Apollo 11 Moon landing on TV. He earned his glider pilot license as a member of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets. He joined the Canadian Armed Forces and earned an engineering degree at Royal Military College. While in the military he learned to fly various types of aircraft and eventually became a test pilot and flew several experimental planes. As part of an exchange program with the United States Navy and United States Air Force, he obtained a Master's degree in aviation systems at the University of Tennessee Space Institute.

Chris is credited with making the first music video ever produced in outer space. He is now an energetic retiree, working tirelessly with school children, to help them develop an appreciation for nature that surrounds all of us, and for our world, in general.

Chris Hadfield has an interesting connection to Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, Canada, the site of our next reunion. You will have to come to Cape Breton to find out what that connection is! The upcoming reunion in 2017 represents only the second time that the Windemuth family has met in Canada. The family gathered in Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada in 1999. Our next reunion in Baddeck, will be very different from the Niagara Falls experience, and certainly different from most of the other reunions. The reunion will be about small town, east coast hospitality. There will be lots of opportunity to enjoy the scenic beauty of Nova Scotia. The pace will be slow and the hospitality warm.

In September 1872, when General Sheridan and party were on their western trip, the city of Yankton gave him a reception. Mr. Wintermute, being on the citizens welcoming committee, very generously extended the hospitality of his house and refreshments toward the entertainment of the party.

In the fall of 1873 Peter was a party to an unfortunate event which resulted in the death of General McCook at Yankton, South Dakota. There had been a meeting called at the insistence of Judge Brookings to consider a law suit that was pending between The People of the County and the Dakota Southern Railroad. McCook and Wintermute were both present at the meeting. Governor Edmunds was called to the chair. Judge Brookings stated the object of the meeting and made a motion to the effect that the meeting should reflect a want of confidence in the said railroad company. While that was under discussion, Wintermute and some friends went down town to the St. Charles Saloon to obtain some cigars. On the way to the saloon, they met McCook on his way back to the courtroom. As they passed, Wintermute made a casual remark to him to which McCook replied somewhat sharply. After Wintermute and his party had passed by, McCook turned and followed them into the saloon. Some words passed between them and the General threatened to whip Wintermute. It was then that Wintermute replied, "McCook, you are a bigger man than I am, if you lick me I will shoot you". Almost instantly, while Wintermute was reaching for a cigar, McCook struck him violently, knocking him down, breaking the glass showcase as he fell. McCook continued beating him, striking him with eight to ten blows, when bystanders interfered and held him, he kicked Wintermute several times on the head and sides. Wintermute, who was badly bruised and lacerated, was assisted up and aided to cleanse himself of blood and dirt. He went back into the meeting seemingly laboring under intense excitement, as appears from his subsequent incoherent remarks and took up the same seat he had previously occupied. On his way, back he procured a pistol, from whom, neither he nor his friends would say. We would here state from the time he received the blows in the saloon until the next day when he found himself in the Merchants Hotel under guard, he has no recollection of anything that occurred. After taking his seat in the court room he rose up, interrupting the speaker, and in a tone indicating intense excitement said, "I have been licked out of my boots by the Secretary of the Territory and have this to show for it", pointing to his bruised face and head and ending in sobs. About this time General McCook returned from the hotel, where he had gone, to the court room, and stood at or near the door. In a few minutes a pistol shot was fired by someone. Where the shot was fired from and by whom there is a conflict of testimony, but the preponderance of it seems to indicate that it was near the door. All was instantly in confusion and there was a general rushing toward the door. McCook was seen advancing upon Wintermute, who, at this

time, fired a shot, and a second one as McCook was upon him, one of them taking effect. McCook, with his Herculean strength, seized Wintermute, who was a child in his hands, threw Wintermute around, threshing chairs and floor with him and in the melee overturning the stove. He attempted to throw Wintermute out of the window, getting him partly out, when those present rescued Wintermute and led McCook away to his room in the hotel, where he expired the next morning.

In October 1873 Peter Wintermute was indicted by the Territorial District Court for manslaughter and was released after posting bail of \$50,000. In March 1874 the court rules that the grand jury had been improperly empaneled and was taken into custody but was released on \$35,000 bail. A new grand jury was impaneled and on April 29, 1874 Peter Wintermute was indicated for the murder of Edwin McCook and was taken back into custody without bail.

Peter's trial began on May 18, 1874 with the prosecution presenting their witnesses followed by the defense witnesses.

Final arguments began on Thursday May 28, 1874 and continued all day Friday, Saturday, Monday and ended late Tuesday afternoon. The case was given to the jury on Wednesday June 1, 1874 and on Thursday rendered their verdict. Peter Wintermute was found "not guilty" of murder but was found "guilty" of manslaughter in the first degree.

On July 7 1874 counsel for Peter Wintermute appealed his conviction before the Territorial Supreme Court. His appeal was granted on January 30, 1875 but was order by the court back into custody and held until any new indictment may be found against him.

A second grand jury indicted Peter Wintermute of murder on May 8, 1875. A change of venue was requested by Peters counsel stating that he could not received a fair trial in Yankton County. The court granted their request and the trial was moved to Vermillion, Clay County.

The trial began on September 2, 1875 with the same witnesses giving substantially the same testimony from his first trial. At the conclusion the case was given to the jury on September 10 and after seven hours returned with a verdict of "not guilty".

Peter Wintermute left Yankton two days later, returning to his fathers home in Chicago. He died on January 29, 1877

Peter Preston Wintermute and Jane Ann Stinson had four children: James Stinson 1860-1896, Thomas Stinson 1863-1888, Anna Clair 1870- 1957, George Preston 1871- 1938.



Dr. James Stinson Wintermute

3rd Great Grandson of Georg Philip Windemuth

James Stinson Wintermute: son of Peter Wintermute and Jane Anna Stinson, was born on April 27, 1860 in St. Paul, Minnesota. He received his early education in Ontario, Canada. He emigrated to Yankton, South Dakota with his parents in 1871. In 1878 he was a cashier in Stinson's Bank, Hamilton, Ontario. He began the study of medicine at Ann Arbor, Michigan, in 1879. He graduated from Rush Medical College, Chicago, Illinois in 1883. After that he completed a course in mineralogy and assaying. In the spring of 1883, he crossed the country and arrived in Tacoma, Washington. In 1887 he returned East and spent considerable time at the Massachusetts General Hospital, reviewing surgery. Later, he would confine himself almost wholly to that branch of medicine and would be a brilliant success. He was appointed one of Peter the Regents of the State University of Washington. On June 18, 1888, he was married to Florence Kortrecht Jones of Olympia, Washington. She was born April 18, 1868. They were the parents of two sons, Peter and Harry Stinson. The Doctor was Past Chancellor of the Knights of Pythias.

Dr. James Wintermute was shot down November 10, 1896, by a maniac on the streets of Tacoma. He died in the hospital at 1:15 pm, three hours and thirty minutes after the fatal shot. The assassin was named Samuel S. Tucker. He had been a patient of Dr. Wintermute at various times and seemed that Tucker somehow imagined that Dr. Wintermute had at some time given him some medicine that injured him. Meeting the Doctor on the street, Tucker started shouting and threatening him. It was but a few moments later that people who were nearby heard the fatal shot. It would seem, that Dr. Wintermute had turned and was leaving him. The bullet had entered



to the left of the spine and just below the lower ribs. The assassin started to run but had gone only a few feet, when he halted, placed the revolver (a 38 caliber) against his own head, fired and fell to the walk a lifeless corpse. The physicians were immediately notified. Many of them reached the hospital before the wounded man. His wife was at once sent for, was on hand and bore up under the fearful strain with wonderful fortitude.

During Dr. Wintermute's life, he began interested in his family history and in 1892 wrote a letter to James Perry Wintermute asking for assistance in procuring material on the family history. They worked together until his death. James Perry continued the work alone and published the Wintermute Family History Book in 1900.

Missing Descendant

Does anyone out there have knowledge of Richard Waters Wintermute, born in Norton, Ohio in 1870? He is my "disappeared" great-grandfather, who lived in Mount Vernon, Ohio in the very early 1900s. He fathered five children (one died early); the third child was my grandma. Our family legend says that his wife Catherine was so very difficult and sharp-tongued that one day he got on a train and ran away. A group of Catherine's male relatives went after him and convinced him to come home and attend to his duties as a husband and a father. But later he ran away again, to California it is said, never to be seen again. My grandma refused to speak of him.

In family papers there is an unsigned note that Richard was traced through military and Social Security records to "somewhere near Seattle" years later. But, of course, the unknown note-writer neglected to include the SS number or actual location or branch of service. Catherine filed for divorce but didn't follow through. Family legend says Richard started a new family in California. Who knows how they knew this. Did he change his name, perhaps to Waters? Do we have aunts, uncles, and cousins in the western US who are unaware of us here in Ohio?

We've hit a brick wall in our research -- we can find no military or death records or anything else. It's as if Richard Waters Wintermute dropped off the face of the earth. If your own genealogy records or family history hold a clue, would you please us know? Please email kimberlyorsborn2015@gmail.com or reply in this newsletter. 



