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In Search of Family - The Windemuth DNA Project

Is Neal Duane Wintermute in Pennsylvania related to Leonard Noal Wintermute in Nebraska?

The Windemuth Family Heritage 1996 tells us they are sixth cousins, once removed, descending from Johann Christoph Windemuth. But are we sure? After all, genealogists know that 16th century documentation can be questionable. Family lore, adopted children and births out-of-wedlock create uncertainty.

In September 2009, Neal and Leonard decided to further examine their relationship. Using Family Tree DNA, a testing laboratory, they submitted DNA samples and waited for the results. The analysis reported that 36 out of their 37 Y-DNA markers are identical. In other words, there is a very high probability that they have a common ancestor within the last 8 generations. This strongly supports our conventional genealogical research that indicates the two are descendants of Johann Christoph Windemuth!

"Neal and Leonard's tests launched the Windemuth DNA Project," according to Susan Meier, our genealogy chair. "This project has been established to facilitate the comparison of Y-DNA samples collected from male Windemuth descendants. We hope to build a database that connects family members and eventually links us to Windemuth families in Europe."

The Windemuth DNA project is open to all males with the Windemuth surname or any of its variations. It is limited to males because the basis of Y-DNA analysis rests on the fact that a man passes his Y-DNA *virtually unchanged* to his male offspring. Hence, male descendants of the same genetic line will have nearly identical Y-DNA.

Females who would like to check their paternal line can ask a male relative with the same surname to be tested.



"While we are confident that the genealogy information our Organization has collected is substantially correct, it is now possible to get a more reliable validation using DNA analysis," said Susan. "By establishing a database of Windemuth DNA, we will answer many questions with greater certainty than we can from conventional research alone. If you are a male with the Windemuth surname or one of its variations, I encourage you to be tested."

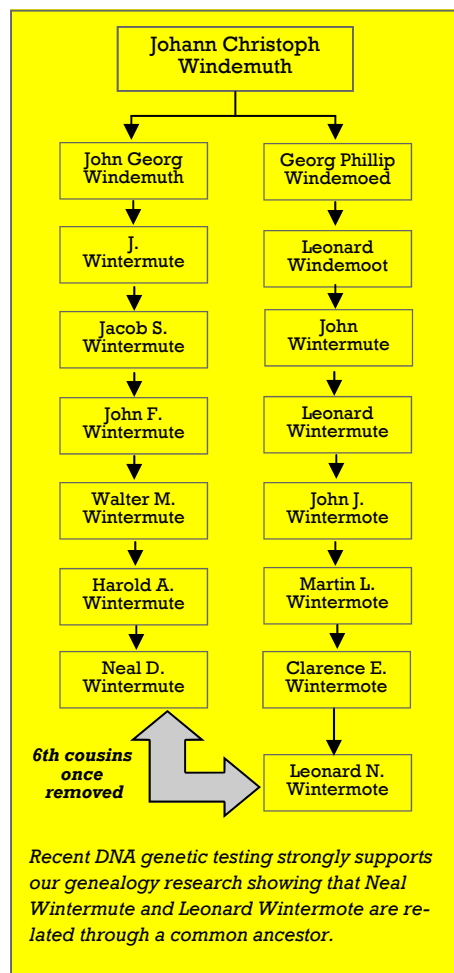
Testing is simple and painless. First, obtain a test kit from Family Tree DNA. Then self administer a cheek-swab,

Letter From the Past - Written by J. P. Wintermute in 1901

Orval Wintermute, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus at Duke University, recently found a letter in an old family bible from J.P. Wintermute, author of "The Windemuth Family History" published in 1900. Here is its story.

I found this letter in an old family bible as I was cleaning out my house in order to move into a retirement village.

The letter was apparently sent to someone in the family of John C. Wintermute who is listed in Vol. 2, page 467 of *The Windemuth Family Heritage* 1996. Since the letter is dated July 13, 1901, it was sent after the 1900 version of *The Windemuth Family History* had been published.

It is possible that someone in the family of John C. Wintermute initiated the correspondence with J.P. Wintermute before the publication of that volume had been completed. On page 151 of

The Windemuth Family History, John C. Wintermute is incorrectly entered as John O. Wintermute, and the only member of his family listed is a son Charles. Since my great uncle Charlie was the only one mentioned in the 1900 edition, I suspect that he may have been the one who initiated the correspondence and the one who is addressed by J.P. Wintermute in the letter as "Dear Cousin."

Dear Cousin

Yours to hand but I can't just locate you yet as you don't give your family relationship only your father and there are so many Johns that it don't indicate much. When you write again say place in Jersey you come from and give the full name of your father and uncles and your grandfather's name and then I can place you. I was born near Zanesville but my father George was born on the family homestead west from Stillwater in 1787. The place still belongs to a grandson of my uncle Peter named Peter A., he was a son of Jephtha. My mother was a Lanterman born 1787 near Blairstown. You want to be sure and order one of the Family Histories that will post you up on all the family name. There were 7 of us children in father's family. I being the youngest aged 69 by next Dec. and the only one of the family living. I have a nephew Dr. G.J.C. Wintermute living up at Celina. He has a family of four daughters. Without question we are related as I have found none of the name but what were related. There were three Emigrators; John George who settled at Stillwater (my great grandfather), Leonard who settled in Sussex above Deckertown and Philip who settled in Pa at Wyoming and was connected with the massacre, his descendants are now nearly all in Canada quite a good many of the younger ones at Buffalo and some at Vancouver British Columbia.

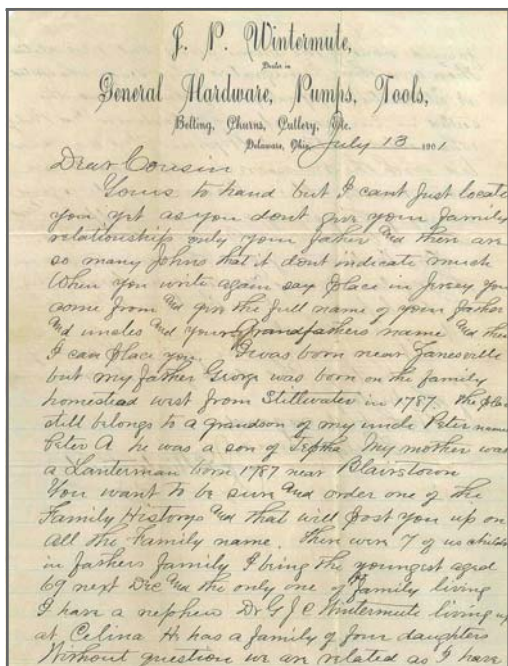
Two Wintermute from this country are in the regular army and are now located in the Philippines. One Wintermute and his wife are in Alaska.

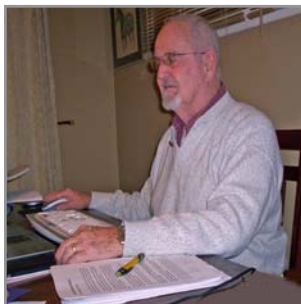


Front page of the 1901 two-page hand-written letter written by J. P. Wintermute, author of the 1900 "Windemuth Family History".

Life in Germany - Prior to Emigrating

First of a three part series; this article looks at the events that shaped families, communities and day to day living in Germany during the 100 years prior to the Windemuths' emigration to America. Part 2 and 3 will be published in future newsletters and will examine the lives of our ancestral women and men.

Part 1

Life was hard; war, extremely cold weather, starvation, pestilence and plagues were all part of daily life.

Johannes Windemuth and his wife Beata raised their family in Allendorf, Hesse-Kassel during the second half of the 17th century. Johannes was originally from the small community of Weidenhausen, four miles south of Allendorf.

Their son, Johan Christoph, his wife Mary M. and their children lived in Pfungstadt, Hesse-Darmstadt, 120 miles, southwest of Allendorf in the early 18th century.

Margaret E. Bernhardt, wife of Johann Georg Windemuth, and her family lived in Kerzenheim, 15 miles southwest of Worms in Rhenish Bavaria, before emigrating to America.

The towns were small and rural; Allen-

dorf was the largest with perhaps 1,000 residents, while Pfungstadt, Kerzenheim and Weidenhausen each had populations of a hundred or so.

Founded in the 8th and 9th centuries, these towns were well established by the 1600s. Constructed of exposed timber, houses were substantial and comfortable. Many are still standing today. Our ancestors probably lived in relative comfort using fire places for heat.

The "Medieval Warm Period" occurred between the 9th and 14th centuries. Abundant crops led to a threefold increase in population. During the 14th century the weather turned cold and it was no longer possible to feed the large population. Many died of starvation and disease.

The cold weather, known as the "Mini Ice Age", continued into the 19th century. The winter of 1709 was so long that farm land in central Germany remained frozen in April.

The Thirty Years War started in 1618 over religious issues. It rapidly expanded into a major free-for-all as the Roman Empire fought to regain control over northern Europe.

Armies from throughout Europe roamed central Germany in bands of 10-12 thousand. Living off the land, they used torture and cruelty to forcibly take food and livestock from the local residents.

Nearly half of the population of central Germany died, most from starvation. Towns were burned, some completely destroyed.

Even after a peace treaty ended the war in 1648, poor diet, disease and plague continued to afflict the population.

Johannes Windemuth and his wife Beata were born during this war and were teenagers when it ended. Two of their three children died as toddlers during the 1670s. Johannes was a wagon maker,

member of the Guild and probably lived a middle class life.

His only surviving child, Johan Christoph was born in 1676 and orphaned at the age of 18. He later became a member of the Tailors Guild and married Mary M. in Pfungstadt in 1702. They had five children, two of whom died before by age three. Mary M. died in 1717, when their youngest son was 6 years old. Johan C. was remarried within the year to Anne E. Wambold. The family emigrated to America between 1731 and 1737.

Margaret E. Bernhardt was born in 1721 in Kerzenheim, in Rhenish Bavaria. She, along with her father John P., mother, and sister began their emigration to America in 1736. After spending a year in England, they arrived in Philadelphia in 1737 where the third daughter was born.

The life experiences of the Bernhardt family in Kerzenheim were similar to those of our Hessen ancestors during this period. Then in 1688, the Nine Years War started.

French King Louis XIV invaded Rhenish Bavaria, also known as the Lower Palatine. The King claimed the Palatinate as the rightful inheritance of his daughter-in-law, even though she had no legitimate claim. Germany and the Roman Empire allied and forced the French army to withdraw.

King Louis XIV ordered his army to destroy and burn everything as they withdrew from the Palatinate. People were given 3-days notice to evacuate before their villages were destroyed. Thousands were left destitute without homes, shelter or food and were forced to beg on the streets of Europe to survive.

The people of the Lower Palatine began a mass immigration to America in 1709. Queen Anne of England, out of compassion, provided passage, refugee camps in England and land grants in Pennsylvania for the German Palatines. The immigration continued into the 1730s as tens of thousands of Palatines, joined by Germans from other regions, emigrated to North America.

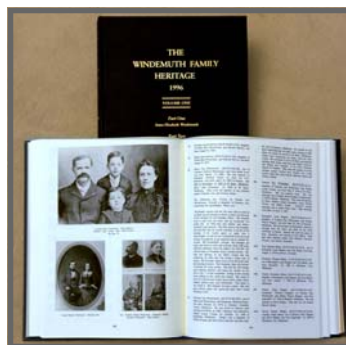
The Windemuths and Bernhardtens remained in Germany until the 1730s. Life for these families must have been acceptably comfortable or they would have emigrated sooner.

Life did improve in Germany after each of these two wars and people were able to accumulate some wealth. A few were able to sell their assets before emigrating in the 1730s.

Perhaps our ancestors were this fortunate. Except for G. Philip Windemuth who settled in Pennsylvania, the Windemuths and Bernhardtens did not receive land grants and both families purchased land in America after they arrived.
