

I was glad to find the Windemuth Family Heritage web site up and running.

Maybe it's been up for a while and I just now located it. Anyway, I would like to get back in the loop.

I have been working on a Family Tree Maker file and through Ancestry.com have uncovered a good number of descendants. I have more recently been recording - within the file - any census info I can find on individuals who have lived in the US.

In my research, I have recently uncovered what may be the most noted Wintermute descendant of all: Jacob Perry

Built by Johann Georg Windemuth in 1755. This photo, circa 1972, was taken prior to the removal of the large building on the right.




Old Stone House Today

Readers Talk Back

In July 2004, *The Windemuth Family Newsletter* published a condensed essay written by Windemuth descendant Rachel Denise Phillips Terry of Centerville, VA. The essay entitled "A Family Civil War History of Andrew Rice Wintamute", documented his life as a soldier and unfortunately his death after his participation in the "Battle of the Wilderness" in 1864. A close friend of his serving in the same Company and Regiment wrote the following poem which was published in the *Wyoming Republican* on July 20, 1864. Thanks to Rachel's grandmother, Lois Tiller, for submitting it.

Written on the death of Andrew R. Wintamute, who was killed at the battle of the Wilderness, May 5th, 1864

*By C. L. Finney
Friend and fellow soldier of Andrew Wintamute*

Death again has been among us,
Loosed the "silver cord" of love,
Broken his the "golden bond,"
Still the pulse of him we love.

When the battle cry of freedom
Swelled so loudly on the air,
Bidding every northern freeman
For the bloody work prepare,

Andrew left his father's fireside,
Young in years, yet brave in heart,
And amid his country's perils,
Nobly did he bear his part.

At Gettysburg he bravely battled
For the right, and faltered not,
Till, from a cursed rebel's rifle,
Came at last a fearful shot.

Wounded, and for a time disabled,
With his friends allowed to meet,
Moved a few brief days among them,
Then was left a vacant seat.

Back again, where war and blood-shed,
Strews the field with dying braves,
Where so many gallant freeman,
Find a lonely soldier's grave.

With his noble comrades marching,
On to meet the hostile foe,

Little dreaming e're the morrow
His active form must be laid low.

But alas! Death's firing missile
Hath performed it's murderous work,
Andrew falls his country's martyr,
Soon is quenched life's vital spark.

Torn with grief his parent's bosom,
For their son will wake no more,
Till the resurrection morning,
Where all wares and tolls are o'er.

Brothers, sisters clad in mourning,
Friends and neighbors drop a tear,
This is but another warning
That grim death is ever near.

Cease fond friends, oh! cease your mourn-
ing,
In the God of battles trust,
Andrew died a gallant soldier,
And we trust is now at rest.

Received the January 2006 newsletter and have thoroughly enjoyed reading all the information contained in it. We were sorry to have missed the reunion in Michigan, but my husband had spinal surgery last November and 3 months later we knew he was facing a second serious surgery in early December 2005.

She hurriedly opened it up and told me she was a descendant of Johann George Windemuth. On page 332 the book indicated his oldest daughter, Mary Margaret Wintermute, had married Moritz Krater, Jr. in 1769. His father had purchased 308 acres of land on Feb 14, 1748, and left it to Morritz, Jr. in 1771 or 1772. In 1780 Morritz, Jr. built a stone house on the property.

Mary Margaret and Morritz had ten children. Candace is a descendent of Mary Margaret. Her brother now owns the original 308 acres.

I want you all to know you never know when you will run into a relative. Hopefully Candace and I can get together soon and further compare our histories.



Wintermute (the one who put together the original Windemuth Family History in 1900) married Henrietta Buckmaster. Their daughter Pearl married Rae D. Henkle who owned a publishing company in New York in the 1920's.

Here's the good part - in 1909 the Henkle's had a daughter named Henrietta. As I was looking for more info on

Henrietta, she popped up as a very famous author with the pseudonym "Henrietta Buckmaster".

This information is further verified in the book *Current Biography*, v. 1946, New York, H.W. Wilson Co.

Below is her death notice as published in the New York Times on April 27, 1983:

HENRIETTA BUCKMASTER, 74, WAS A NOVELIST AND EDITOR

Henrietta Buckmaster, a popular novelist, historian and editor best known for her portrayal of the underground railroad and the abolition movement in the novel "Let My People Go," died Tuesday after a short illness at a convalescent home in Chestnut Hill, Mass. She was 74 years old and lived in Boston.

At the time of her death, she was editor of the Home Forum and the fine arts and literary page of The Christian Science Monitor, where she had worked since 1973.

A prolific writer of children's stories as well as historical novels, Miss Buckmaster was known

also for her wide humanitarian interests, which included participation in the civil-rights movement and other causes, such as those of American Indians and prisoners' rights.

Among Miss Buckmaster's other works were the novel "And Walk in Love," published in 1956; "All the Living" (1962), and "A Lion in the Stone" (1968).

Miss Buckmaster was born Henrietta Henkle in Cleveland. She had once been married to Peter John Stephens, and wrote at one time as Henrietta Henkle Stephens.

Miss Buckmaster had no immediate survivors.

Talk with family members in your area and consider hosting the event. By moving the reunion around North America, we offer all family members the opportunity of attending.


The past 4 reunions were held in Niagara Falls, Ontario; Branson, Missouri; Walnut Creek, California and Frankenmuth, Michigan.

The Windemuth Family Heritage 1996 — Only \$65 + Shipping

Jacob Perry Wintermute originally published the Windemuth Family History in 1900. In 1996, James Woodrow Wintermute chaired a committee to update and republish this important history as The Windemuth Family Heritage 1996. Quoting from the Introduction:

“This book contains the history of the family Windemuth, from the first humble beginnings in Pfungstadt, Germany in the early sixteen hundreds, and spans nearly four centuries. It is a proud history, rich in tradition and perseverance. The family Windemuth has grown from just a small handful, to many thousands. This book contains a brief history of every Windemuth de-



scendant that we could locate, or learn about, and we located and learned about a lot of them.”

The two-volume set contains more than 700 pages and was professionally published by Gateway Press, Baltimore MD at a cost of \$110. The price of the remaining copies have been reduced to \$65 plus \$12.50 US for shipping.
