## Location of the 2009 Windemuth Family Reunion

The 2009 Windemuth Family Reunion will be held in the beautiful Black Hills of Western South Dakota. The date for this biennial event is July 8-10, 2009; the location is Rapid City, South Dakota.

Our hosts for the reunion are Zetha and Bud Estes, and Herb and Sue Cook. Zetha and Herb are Windemuth descendants and reside in the area. "The Black Hills of South Dakota are one of the top vacation

choices in the United States," according to Sue Cook. "Each year three million people visit Mount Rushmore and other attractions in the area."

Things to see and do while in the Black Hills area includes a visit to five National Parks and Monuments (Mt. Rushmore, Wind Cave, Devils Tower, Badlands and Jewel Cave). The Mammoth Site, an active archaeological dig, is not far away in Hot Springs. Thirty minutes Northwest of Rapid City is the town of Deadwood where you

will find the final resting spot of some of the most colorful characters of the old west; among them Wild Bill Hickok, Calamity Jane and Potato Creek Johnny. East of Rapid City, near the Badlands, is Wall Drug Store where the Hustead family still promises free ice water. Once listed as one of the "corniest places" in the country

by *USA Today*, it nonetheless attracts thousands of visitors each year.

The Black Hills is a family friendly area that offers lots of free things kids will enjoy. Bring your children and grandchildren so they can play at Dinosaur Park with life-size replicas of dinosaurs. Storybook Island Children's Park, a family favorite, provides 140 scenes from fairy tales complete with animals, castles, trains and cottages.

Young and old alike will enjoy Bear Country U.S.A. which gives you a close-up look at some of the largest animals in North America. The 200-acre drive-through park features black, brown and grizzly bear, elk, big horn sheep, bison and other critters roaming free.

Planned activities for the reunion include an opening reception on July 8<sup>th</sup>, a family meeting and group photo shoot on July 9<sup>th</sup>, and a bus tour followed by the closing dinner on July 10<sup>th</sup>. Plenty of unscheduled time will permit opportunities to "catch-up" on news from distant family members, meet new "cousins", and explore the

## Marjorie Wintermute - An American Artist

On January 20, 1904, Marjorie Wintermute Schiffeler (née Marjorie Culver Wintermute), the youngest of two daughters, was born in San Francisco, California, to Dr. & Mrs. George Preston Wintermute. After attending Miss Ransom and Miss Bridges' School for Girls in Piedmont, California, she studied with noted teachers in Paris, Fontainebleau, and Vienna.

At the age of five, Marjorie developed a precocious knack of picking out the works of leading masters from their brushstroke and style. At thirteen she entered the California School of Fine Arts, and at the end of her first year won a New York Art Student's League Scholarship (1918) winning it twice again in 1919 and 1920. For several years she worked alone in Gloucester, Massachusetts, and elsewhere, hiring her models and painting independently of teachers. Later, Marjorie

went to New York and studied under Cecelia Beaux [1855-1942], who wrote, "The very great emotion of your work will be appreciated. Your style is not imitative of any school but is original and entirely American."

In her twenties she won acclaim with her painting, "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," which was requested by the State of Virginia to be permanently hung at the State Capitol in Richmond. This painting was subsequently hung in the Spreckels Museum in San Francisco, where it remained for five years.

A second oil painting, "A Bit of Old China," was also honored by being hung in the same museum for two years.

In 1938, Marjorie met Carl Schiffeler, a professor of music and an accomplished operatic performer in New York, Chicago, San Francisco, and Berlin. He came from a background of German nobility, his father having been Baron Karl von Steinschiffeler II. After a one-year courtship, Marjorie and Carl were married and a son John William was born on September 21, 1940. They lived in San Francisco until their marriage tragically ended in 1943, when Carl died unexpectedly.

In May 1961, The American Red Cross awarded Marjorie W. Schiffeler a Certificate:

Brenda Dreifke, 48, spends most of her workday at Milwaukee's Midwest Airlines behind her desk on the phone and checking e-mails - a job that doesn't exactly appear heroic. But just a few weeks ago, Dreifke left her office to take a newspaper and a sandwich to a man she'd never met - a man without a home or a dime to his name. As she sat chatting face-to-face with "Chris" at Milwaukee's airport, no one would ever guess that their meeting likely altered

his life.

In fact, Dreifke's mostly anonymous work with many individuals has this same life-altering effect. As coordinator of the Midwest Airlines Miracle Miles Program - which provides free miles to registered non-profit organizations through donations by Midwest

Airlines and Midwest Miles members - she helped nearly 400 people in the last year, including Chris, fly to locations for specialty medical treatment or services they desperately needed. According to Dreifke, 99 percent of the people she helps will only know her as a voice on the phone.

Despite this, she says, "I almost become part of their family because I'm making these important decisions with them to get to their destination. I have nothing to do with their treatment or their life after treatment. Sometimes they don't have a home to go to, but I will do what I can for them so it's one less thing on their to-do list."

Dreifke often supports families who have spent their life savings seeking medical treatment to cure a loved one. "I'm very often their last resort call. Within 10 minutes I can have a flight number and a confirmed seat to get the medical treatment they need."

## Visit Germany in 2010 for a Windemuth Family Reunion

Susan Gale Wintermute has agreed to host a Windemuth Family Reunion in or near Pfungstadt located in the state of Hessen, Germany. Pfungstadt is the ancestral town where the Windemuth's lived before emigrating to North America in the 1730's.

Susan was born in New Jersey and now resides in Germany where she teaches at a local university. Her multi-lingual ability and knowledge of the country make this an outstanding opportunity for family members wanting to visit their ancestral homeland.

Reunion details remain to be worked out, but the probable date will be late summer 2010. It will last several days and then allow time for independent travel on your own.

## In Search of: The Origin and Meaning of Windemuth

Michael A. Wintermute, age 76, is an 8th generation descendant of J.G. Windemuth. Prior to retirement, Mike held executive positions in the electronic and communications industry. Extensive international travel over the past 35 years has afforded him the opportunity to visit and explore Phungstadt and Allendorf, the German towns our ancestors came from. When I was young, my father often spoke of family history. He said the name Windemuth translated to "courage in hard times" or "windy courage". As I grew older, I questioned these translations and began my own search for our name's origin and meaning.

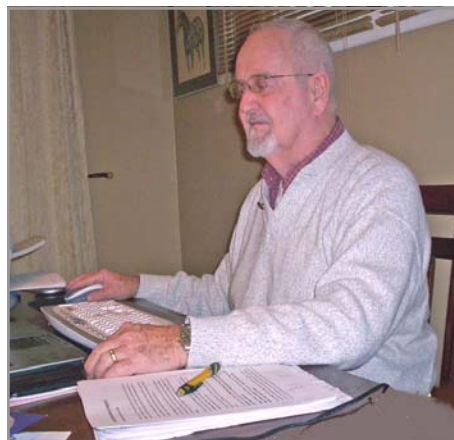
Two distinct words, *winde* and *muth* form the name and hold keys to its meaning and origin. Modern German-English dictionaries provide a variety of meanings for *winde* and for *muth*, but none that make sense for Windemuth.

The word *wende*, was the German name for various Slavic tribes that wandered into Germanic territory. Word meanings and usage change over time and today *winde* is translated to mean windlass and is the German name for the morning glory.

The historic meaning of *muth/mut*, as used in our name, was defined to mean; *fühlen*, (*feeling*), *denken*, (*thought*), *begehren*, (*desire*), and *streben*, (*aspire or strive*). The German *muth* is also the root word for

the English word *mood*. Today, *muth* means courage.

*Wende* and *Winde* are both listed in Bahlow's German Name dictionary and appear to be very much the same. As I searched for more information I found the spelling *wende*

was common in the northern part of Germany while farther south it was spelled *winde*. We should note that the written form of German words and family names did not become fixed until about 1600 and this could be a contributor to the two spellings *Wendemuth* and *Windemuth*.

I did an Internet search of northern Germany and found more *Wendemuths* than *Windemuths*. I also searched southern Germany and found many more *Windemuths* than *Wendemuths*. This seems to confirm the variation in spelling between north and south. We find the name *Windemuth* in Allendorf church records, in central Germany, neither north nor south.

According to Bahlow, German fam-

ily names were not typical until the Late Middle Ages, specifically during the years of the German mercenaries. The family name *Wendemuth*, therefore, would likely have originated sometime during the 13<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup> century, possibly in the central or north central region of Germany. The spelling would have varied, as it has since coming to America, to also include *Windemuth*.

Family names originated earlier in emerging cities than in rural communities. This is because as towns grew, the need for lists of citizens and tax roles became necessary.

We find *Windemuths* in the Allendorf church records of the 1600's. Johannas is identified as a tradesman. This may indicate that several generations of his predecessors were also town dwelling tradesmen. The family name therefore may have been taken as early as 1250. Had they been from a rural area, the name would have been taken later, possibly around 1350.

I believe it is reasonable to conclude that our family name was probably in existence for 3 or 4 hundred years before we find it in Allendorf. Further, the original name was probably spelled *Wendemuth* and the spelling evolved to include *Windemuth*. This would have occurred prior to German names becoming fixed at the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

To satisfy my curiosity I did an Internet search in towns near Allen-

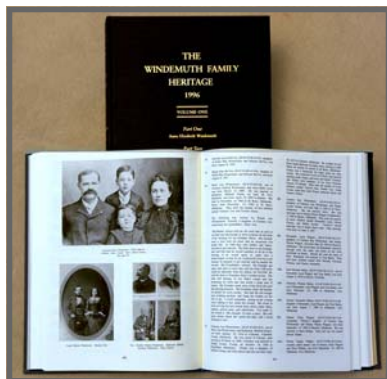
dorf and found both *Wendemuths* and *Windemuths*. Another search found several *Wendemuths* here in the USA, in addition to the *Windemuths*, *Wintermutes*, etc.

Unfortunately, it is impossible to learn the actual time or the specific region of Germany where it originated. I have identified two spellings of the name existing side by side, even today.

The original meaning of the name, provided by Dr. Bahlow, lacks the connotation of what the original translation implied. Could it have been the name given to a “flexible kind of guy who was easy to get along with” or did it mean something else? Dr. Bahlow states that derogatory names were generally dropped and did not survive the High Middle Ages. Therefore, we can conclude the name did not have a negative meaning and was acceptable to the family.
